



## Our Focus

The Nutrition Education Program works in all 120 counties to improve the lives of limited-resource Kentuckians through education and changes in behavior and in their community. Through the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program Education (SNAP-Ed) and the Expanded Food and Nutrition Education Program (EFNEP), the University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service has agents and nutrition assistants across the state who are dedicated to improving lives where they live.

## Our Challenge

### Poverty

According to US Census estimates for 2016, the median household income in Kentucky is **\$46,610**, almost 20% lower than the U.S. median household income of **\$57,617**.<sup>1</sup> Kentucky also has higher percentages of poverty and food insecurity among its population compared to census estimate for the United States overall.

In 2016, an estimated **3,998** Hart County residents lived in poverty, and **1,317** of those were children under 18. This represents a **0.9%** increase in total poverty and **5.5%** decrease in child poverty since 2008.<sup>1</sup>

### Obesity

Today, about half of all Americans have one or more chronic diseases, often related to poor diet.<sup>2</sup> These include high blood pressure, cardiovascular disease, type 2 diabetes and stroke which are often associated with obesity.



In 2017, the percentage of obese adults in Kentucky was **34.3%**, ranking it in the top 10 states for highest obesity rates in the country. Kentucky was also ranked in the top 10 for high percentages of adults with diabetes (**12.9%**) and adults with hypertension (**39.4%**).<sup>3</sup> A large body of evidence shows that healthy eating habits and regular physical activity can help people achieve and maintain good health and reduce the risk of chronic disease throughout life.<sup>2</sup>

In 2014, **37.4%** of Hart County's adult population were considered obese.<sup>4</sup>

## Our Solution

Provide hands-on, nutrition education to limited-resource audiences, focusing on:

- Buying and preparing healthy foods
- Developing new meal planning and cooking skills
- Adopting new healthy lifestyle behaviors
- Managing SNAP resources

In 2018, 3,538 Hart County residents with limited resources participated in nutrition education lessons.

## Our Results

### IN KENTUCKY

#### Lifestyle improvements

In 2018, 95% of adult participants made a positive change in food group choices and 91% showed improvement in one or more food safety practices. In addition, 90% showed improvement in one or more food resource management practices and 83% made changes to be more physically active. Youth participants also experienced behavior changes, with 83% improving their ability to choose healthy foods.

## Our Success

### Positive results from the "Healthier You" program

The adult obesity rate for Hart County in 2012 was 34%, and only 63% percent of adults living in the county indicated that they were physically active. As a result, 26% of adults said they were in poor to fair health. Furthermore, a large number of premature deaths were reported. To address these health issues, the Hart County Health Department and the Hart County Family and Consumer Sciences agent teamed up for the 16-week Healthier You program. It included lessons on understanding blood pressure, heart disease, BMI, food label reading, the importance of exercise, understanding diabetes and other health-related topics. Participants were involved in individual challenges, as well as team challenges. As a direct result of this program, nine participants lost a total of 32 pounds. At the end of the program, two participants had lower blood pressure and all indicated they were more active. This program also resulted in individuals forming support groups to encourage each other to be more active.
