

Our Focus

The Kentucky Nutrition Education Program, as part of the University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service, encompasses two separate USDA programs:

The Expanded Food and Nutrition Education Program (EFNEP) and the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program Education (SNAP-Ed). Both programs utilize agents and assistants to provide educational opportunities for limited-resource individuals and families to acquire knowledge, develop skills, and change behaviors for improved health and well-being.

Our Challenge

Poverty

According to US Census estimates for 2017, the median household income in Kentucky is \$48,332, almost 20% lower than the U.S. median household income of \$60,336. Kentucky also has higher percentages of poverty and food insecurity among its population compared to census estimate for the United States overall.

In 2017, an estimated **1,25**7 Ballard County residents lived in poverty, and an estimated **403** were children under 18.¹

Obesity

Today, about half of all Americans have one or more chronic diseases, often related to poor diet and physical inactivity.² These include high blood pressure, cardiovascular disease, type 2 diabetes and stroke.



In 2017, the percentage of obese adults in Kentucky was 34.3%, ranking it in the top 10 states for highest obesity rates in the country. The percentage of physically inactive Kentuckians was 34.4%, ranking it as the most physically inactive state in the nation. Kentucky was also ranked in the top 10 for high percentages of adults with diabetes (12.9%) and adults with hypertension (39.4%).³ A large body of evidence shows that healthy eating habits and regular physical activity can help people achieve and maintain good health and reduce the risk of chronic disease throughout life.²

In 2015, **35.5**% of Ballard County's adult population were considered obese, and **34.9**% were considered physically inactive.⁴

Our Solution

Provide hands-on, nutrition education to limited-resource audiences, focusing on:

- Buying and preparing healthy foods
- Developing new meal planning and cooking skills
- Adopting new healthy lifestyle behaviors
- Managing SNAP resources

In 2019, **1,397** contacts were made with Ballard County residents who participated in nutrition education programming.

Our Results

IN KENTUCKY

Lifestyle improvements

In 2019, 97% of adult participants made a positive change in food group choices and 83% showed improvement in one or more food safety practices. In addition, 92% showed improvement in one or more food resource management practices and 90% made changes to be more physically active. Youth participants also experienced behavior changes, with 87% improving their ability to choose healthy foods.

Our Success

Back to School Bash Successful in Ballard County

he Ballard County school system is 62% free- and reduced-lunch eligible and, therefore, provides free lunches for every student. Every year Ballard County Schools hosts a Back-To-School Bomber Bash. The Ballard County Cooperative Extension takes part in the Bomber Bash by having SNAP-Ed items such as tote bags, spoons/spatulas, Chop Chop magazine, pencils, recipe cards, and more. The Agriculture and Natural Resources agent, staff assistant, and 4-H agent help set up the event. This year, 250 bags with goodies were given out at this popular event. Nutritious after-school snacks that also can be made at home were also provided. This year it was a trail mix. The parents were especially interested in the Plate It Up Kentucky Proud recipes and the nutritious snack recipe. This is an ongoing program organized by the school system's Family Resource and Youth Service Center, with which Ballard County Cooperative Extension proudly partners.
