



Our Focus

The Kentucky Nutrition Education Program, as part of the University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service, encompasses two separate USDA programs: The Expanded Food and Nutrition Education Program (EFNEP) and the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program Education (SNAP-Ed). Both programs utilize agents and assistants to provide educational opportunities for limited-resource individuals and families to acquire knowledge, develop skills, and change behaviors for improved health and well-being.

Our Challenge

Poverty

According to US Census estimates for 2017, the median household income in Kentucky is **\$48,332**, almost 20% lower than the U.S. median household income of **\$60,336**.¹ Kentucky also has higher percentages of poverty and food insecurity among its population compared to census estimate for the United States overall.

In 2017, an estimated **3,295** Bourbon County residents lived in poverty, and an estimated **1,018** were children under 18.¹

Obesity

Today, about half of all Americans have one or more chronic diseases, often related to poor diet and physical inactivity.² These include high blood pressure, cardiovascular disease, type 2 diabetes and stroke.



In 2017, the percentage of obese adults in Kentucky was **34.3%**, ranking it in the top 10 states for highest obesity rates in the country. The percentage of physically inactive Kentuckians was **34.4%**, ranking it as the most physically inactive state in the nation. Kentucky was also ranked in the top 10 for high percentages of adults with diabetes (**12.9%**) and adults with hypertension (**39.4%**).³ A large body of evidence shows that healthy eating habits and regular physical activity can help people achieve and maintain good health and reduce the risk of chronic disease throughout life.²

In 2015, **34.9%** of Bourbon County's adult population were considered obese, and **31.4%** were considered physically inactive.⁴

Our Solution

Provide hands-on, nutrition education to limited-resource audiences, focusing on:

- Buying and preparing healthy foods
- Developing new meal planning and cooking skills
- Adopting new healthy lifestyle behaviors
- Managing SNAP resources

In 2019, **12,284** contacts were made with Bourbon County residents who participated in nutrition education programming.

Our Results

IN BOURBON COUNTY

Lifestyle improvements

In 2019, **98%** of adult participants made a positive change in food group choices and **79%** showed improvement in one or more food safety practices. In addition, **96%** showed improvement in one or more food resource management practices and **98%** made changes to be more physically active. Youth participants also experienced behavior changes, with **93%** improving their ability to choose healthy foods.

Our Success

Packing the Backpacks in Bourbon County

The Bourbon County Backpack Program's main goal is to reduce hunger for children in our community. During the 2018-19 school year, 16,577 backpack bags were sent home with Paris and Bourbon County students, with an average of approximately 417 students receiving food each week. This number is almost twice what it was four years ago, and almost 20% of the total enrollment of Paris and Bourbon County Schools is now being served by the Backpack Program weekly. The program also facilitates "giving back." Donations of food, time, and money are all returned to the youth of Paris and Bourbon County. All of the funding for this program comes from community donations; all of the food is packed by community volunteers.
